MARINE RESCUE NSW – PORT STEPHENS UNIT SERVICES PROVIDED



Category One Marine Search and Rescue Co-ordination Centre (SARCC). Located at the former Inner Light and now Heritage Site at Nelson Head, 32°42.632 S; 152°09.667 E (overlooking Shoal Bay and looking out through the entrance to Port Stephens). Accredited by the State Rescue Board.

Communications Centre, Nelson Head - VMR217. Operated by trained and qualified volunteers, 24 hours a day; 7 days a week; 365 days a year. Monitoring 27MHz, and VHF marine frequencies, emergency and calling channels.

Apart from radio coverage generally to the local boating community, the Communications Centre offers:

- Emergency support to vessels in trouble
- A Marine Radio Safety (MRS) service Boat Register
- A checkpoint and radio coverage for recreational vessels transiting up and down the coastline adjacent to Port Stephens.
- Weather readings and local conditions observations and
- Current Bureau of Meteorology weather forecasts and tidal information. (These can be obtained by contacting the Comms Centre by phone or radio and are also offered in regular radio skeds).

Accredited Rescue Vessels : Available on a 24 hr. call-out basis, subject to Police tasking. (See 'Rescue Vessels' page).

Weather recording facility : Accredited by the Bureau of Meteorology. Regular reports on local conditions are electronically communicated to the Bureau, as well as to Radio, TV and Print media outlets in the local area.

Gift Shop : Marine Rescue Port Stephens operates a unique gift shop on the ground floor of the Marine Rescue Communications Centre at Nelson Head Reserve, Nelson Bay. The shop offers gifts with a nautical flavour and a range to suit every budget. Without income from the Gift Shop, the Unit would find it very difficult, if not near impossible, to operate. Open to the public, 7 days a week from 9am to 3pm.


Nelson Head Reserve: Marine Rescue Port Stephens Unit of which Marine Rescue NSW is the responsible entity to the State Government for upkeep of this Crown Land heritage precinct "Reserve".

A small museum is operated by volunteers and is open to the public, 7 days a week from 9am to 3pm.

A portion of the Historic Lighthouse Keepers Cottage is leased to a private operator "Inner Light Tea Rooms" for breakfast, lunch, morning and afternoon teas/coffee, from 8.30am to 3.00pm.

Thoughts from Volunteers Week

Volunteers Week has just concluded and it brought me timely thought about how we need to increase our member base by around 25% in the next few years to cope with the ever increasing need to raise funds

to support our operating costs – which like everything else are rising dramatically each year.

We are currently planning our FY2023-24 budget but I know from our Strategic Planning exercise over the last months that we will need in the vicinity of \$190,000 annually in years to come to keep operating – quite aside from the capital funds required to develop the new Command Centre.

The State Government currently only covers around \$30,000 of that. There is no doubt that with the volunteer efforts including fundraising within emergency Services such as ours and our sister services - the RFS and SES – the State Government gets a pretty good deal. Whale Season - Marine Rescue NSW urges boaters to be careful during whale migration season

Boaters on the Sydney and Hunter Coasts are being advised to not to get too close to whales as they make their annual trip north to warmer waters.

Multiple pods of humpbacks have been spotted off the coast from the Royal National Park to Seal Rocks in recent days.

Marine Rescue NSW Commissioner Alex Barrell has sent out the following message: He said boaters need to be aware of the marine mammals.

"As we are starting to see the whale migration along the NSW Coast, Marine Rescue is reminding boaters that

 there are rules and restrictions in place for the wellbeing of the animal but also the safety of boaters. "Boaters are not to come within 100 metres of a whale or 300 metres of a whale and a calf. "If a whale does surface near your vessel it is important that you cut your motors and slow down to a safe speed," he said. Commissioner Barrell is also reminding skippers not to approach whales from behind or to wait in front of their path. The Marine Rescue NSW Commissioner said no more than three vessels at a time should approach whales and 	Commissioner Barrell said. 

It is an opportunity for these two volunteer organisations to provide a service to the Port Stephens boating community with information that may enhance their day on the water or warn them of problems ahead, even though it is on different types of radio communications.


OPERATIONS

As the Bay begins to feel the bite of the colder weather that autumn brings we tend to see fewer boaters on the water than during our peak summer period. Fewer boats on the water generally translates to fewer logons with Marine Rescue Port Stephens and fewer marine incidents for the unit to manage. Something which has not been fewer is the coverage that our volunteers have been able to provide to the boating community by maintaining a 24/7 listening watch on the radio or waiting for 'that phone call' asking for help.

Our rescue vessel responses to those in need during the recent months have again occurred at all hours of the day and night and at times in miserable weather conditions – something our volunteers accomplish with aplomb. A challenging rescue completed successfully, always raises the camaraderie of our motely crew of professional volunteers who would welcome someone like you to join our team with open arms – come and have a look!



Damp Eagle is the name of an exercise which is becoming a regular RAAF 2SQN event involving Marine Rescue Port Stephens. The aim of the exercise is to familiarise the wedgetail aircrew with their personal protective equipment in a marine environment.



This involves both of our rescue vessels and the Search and Rescue helicopter from the RAAF base as the aircrew practice life raft entry, wet winching, radio functionalities and also other survival aids from the top of Mt Tomaree. The latest iteration occurred on Tuesday 4th of April and was guite successful.

Nobody wants to hear a knocking sound coming from anywhere remotely close to an engine, unfortunately this is exactly what our crew onboard our larger vessel, Port Stephens 31 (PS31) heard one morning. This was a great pick up from an observant crew as the investigation identified an issue with the fire pump pulley system and harmonic balancer. This issue and subsequent fix rendered the rescue vessel inoperative for approximately two weeks.

The flexibility and resilience our unit gains by having two vessels was again highlighted with the rescue on Saturday 22 April at the Big Gibber, some 19 Nm NE of the port entrance, when our smaller vessel, Port Stephens 30 (PS30) was able to conduct the assist while PS31 was being fixed. This assist was one of many by 'the little boat that can'.



Although capable, PS30's replacement time is fast approaching. Keep your eyes peeled on the water this winter and you may see our crews putting the new vessel (and ourselves) through the paces to ensure that we and the rescue vessel are ready for that next call for help.

RESCUES AND ASSISTS

Another training session that turned into an operation.

It's a Tuesday morning 16th May and Marine Rescue vessels PS30 and PS31 were heading to Salamander Bay for training when PS31 was activated by Port Stephens Water Police to render assistance to a large 19 metre (62 feet) sail catamaran with engine problems.

The vessel was anchored in shallow water at Oyster Cove near Lemon Tree Passage.

Navigating to Oyster Cove brings challenges due to the abundance of oyster leases, narrow channels with tight turns and very shallow waters - sometimes less than one metre deep.

Both rescue vessels headed to the location to determine the precise location of the catamaran.





Once on-scene it was determined that PS31 could undertake the assist even though the catamaran was only anchored in 1.5m of water.

A tow was established after helping the skipper of the vessel retrieve their anchor after as it was tangled in some old mooring lines.

PS31 initially had to manoeuvre alongside to establish lines. Both vessels were then turned on the spot to head back out the very narrow channel. A short tow was established to clear the channels and shallow water.

In clear water the tow was lengthened and both vessels headed back to D'Albora Marina.

At the marina the catamaran was again tied alongside PS31 and carefully maneuvered to a wharf. A very thankful skipper on the catamaran thanked all the crew on PS31.

Good job all round especially manoeuvring such a large vessel in tight and shallow waterways.

RESCUES AND ASSISTS CONT'D

A cuddy cabin runabout with engine issues was drifting around the Corlette Beach area and was close to the sailing vessels racing course on Saturday 20th May.

PS30 was tasked to locate and assist the runabout.

Once on scene, PS30 crew quickly established a tow of the vessel back to Soldiers Point ramp - keeping out of the way of the number of races going on at the time.

Vessel and owners safely delivered back to the ramp.

With a number of training days lately turning operational, this Saturday morning training 20th May turned out to be no different and was again eventful and productive.

After being tasked to assist a Trimaran in Shoal Bay, both Marine Rescue Port Stephens rescue vessels left the marina to attend the Trimaran.

On locating the vessel, it could be seen what the issue was. Somehow the vessel's anchor had become fouled in a large metal structure it had picked up off the bottom of the seabed. Amazing what you can find by chance lying around the seabed! The owner of the vessel was going to be heading out further up the coast but was unable to disentangle the anchor.

Windy conditions and a mounting swell had the vessel drifting around the moorings. It was determined the best option was to put some rescue crew on the Trimaran to deal with the issue.

After some manipulation, the rather large piece of debris was stabilised and then with some close quarters boat manoeuvring, the anchor was pulled free.

Some clean up and a very happy boat owner then free to continue on his voyage without further incident.

A slightly unusual incident to deal with, however, job well done to boat crew for a successful outcome.

- Your mobile phone number • Number of people on board
- When you plan to return

Log On whenever you're heading out on the water and Log Off when you return. We'll stand watch. If you don't Log Off as planned, our volunteers will start searching for you.

To Log On, call Marine Rescue Port Stephens on VHF Channel 16 or use the free Marine Rescue App. You can download the App at the App Store for Apple devices or Google Play for Androids.





You can always Log On, whether you're out for a morning's fishing, a day trip around your local area or cruising along the coastline. And it doesn't matter if you're on a tinnie, a cruiser, a yacht, a kayak, a canoe or a jet ski.

When you Log On via, our radio operator will ask you for some basic information about your vessel, your destination and contacts.

You'll enter the same details on your smartphone or other device if you're using the Marine Rescue app.

If you don't Log Off, this information will help us find you, whether you've simply forgotten to Log Off when you returned to shore or you're caught in an emergency and need help fast.

Tell us:

- Your boat registration number
- Where you're leaving from
- Where you're heading
- What time you plan to return
- The number of people on board
- Your mobile phone number

If the fish are biting and you decide to stay out longer, simply call Marine Rescue Port Stephens on VHF Ch 16 or use the Marine Rescue App to update your arrival time.

Remember to Log Off when you're back on shore. If you haven't let us know you're back safely, we'll start to look for you. We'll try calling you first up, just in case you've forgotten to Log Off and headed home with your catch. That's the best outcome. If we get no answer, we'll step up the response.

When you Log On via the App, choose the live safety tracking option so your position is updated in our vessel tracking system every 30 minutes. This means that in an emergency, our rescue crews will have a starting point for a search operation, based on your last known position, saving valuable time when minutes can mean the difference between life and death.

Skeds

If you're travelling along the coastline, we encourage you to establish a voyage plan with Marine Rescue Port Stephens and an offshore tracking schedule for you to check in (to 'sked') with our bases along your route. This lets us know that you're travelling safely, on schedule and not in need of emergency help. We'll keep track of your progress until you safely arrive at your destination in NSW or we hand you over to the marine rescue service in the next State if you're travelling further north or south.



What better way to spend a day out than an easy boat trip to Broughton Island for a bush walk and picnic.






The second activity revolves around international code flags and is a little more involved for primary school aged children. Around the museum, inside and outside, are 10 different images each of one flag and one pennant. The flag provides the letter of the alphabet whilst the pennant provides the numbered place in the word for the letter to go. All up there are 10 to be found which will spell out the code word. Again, a couple of the images are harder to spot but our helpful guides can assist in locating them if anyone gets stuck. Children already enjoy the code flags in the Light Room, pulling them out and identifying what they represent, so it seemed a logical extension to develop an activity around these flags.

Some parents have frankly looked quite relieved when our guides offered an activity to their children especially if they're waiting for a table in the Tea Rooms. Older siblings often join in and help the younger family members to find the answers.

It is such a pleasure for all our guides to have children become excited and have fun whilst visiting the museum. We are potentially sowing the seeds of a life-long interest in our history by providing this fun experience.
