#### MARINE RESCUE NSW – PORT STEPHENS UNIT SERVICES PROVIDED





Category One Marine Search and Rescue Co-ordination Centre (SARCC). Located at the former Inner Light and now Heritage Site at Nelson Head, 32°42.632 S; 152°09.667 E (overlooking Shoal Bay and looking out through the entrance to Port Stephens). Accredited by the State Rescue Board.

**Communications Centre, Nelson Head** - VMR217. Operated by trained and qualified volunteers, 24 hours a day; 7 days a week; 365 days a year. Monitoring 27MHz, and VHF marine frequencies, emergency and calling channels.

Apart from radio coverage generally to the local boating community, the Communications Centre offers:

- Emergency support to vessels in trouble
- A Marine Radio Safety (MRS) service Boat Register
- A checkpoint and radio coverage for recreational vessels transiting up and down the coastline adjacent to Port Stephens.
- Weather readings and local conditions observations and
- Current Bureau of Meteorology weather forecasts and tidal information. (These can be obtained by contacting the Comms Centre by phone or radio and are also offered in regular radio skeds).

**Accredited Rescue Vessels :** Available on a 24 hr. call-out basis, subject to Police tasking. (See 'Rescue Vessels' page).

**Weather recording facility**: Accredited by the Bureau of Meteorology. Regular reports on local conditions are electronically communicated to the Bureau, as well as to Radio, TV and Print media outlets in the local area.

**Gift Shop**: Marine Rescue Port Stephens operates a unique gift shop on the ground floor of the Marine Rescue Communications Centre at Nelson Head Reserve, Nelson Bay. The shop offers gifts with a nautical flavour and a range to suit every budget. Without income from the Gift Shop, the Unit would find it very difficult, if not near impossible, to operate. Open to the public, 7 days a week from 9am to 3pm.


**Nelson Head Reserve**: Marine Rescue Port Stephens Unit of which Marine Rescue NSW is the responsible entity to the State Government for upkeep of this Crown Land heritage precinct "Reserve".

A small museum is operated by volunteers and is open to the public, 7 days a week from 9am to 3pm.

A portion of the Historic Lighthouse Keepers Cottage is leased to a private operator "Inner Light Tea Rooms" for breakfast, lunch, morning and afternoon teas/coffee, from 8.30am to 3.00pm.

#### **Keeping Up the Service**

I am very conscious of the difficulties local businesses are having post-COVID-19 shutdown in hiring staff and coping with increased costs brought on by global turmoil

and associated cost spikes in fossil fuel and food. One only needs to dine out to find out how these costs are affecting us.

Marine Rescue is subject to the same cost pressures of course – particularly with regard to the costs of boat fuel and the supply of spare parts for our boats and in maintenance costs associated with operating the Nelson Head Base.

As part of the 5 year Strategic Plan put in place last September, we have been addressing operating costs, their containment and how we fund them. To run our operation requires a budget of around \$190,000 annually of which only roughly \$30,000 is supplied by the State Government.


Costs are rising, but so are the demands on our services – the last financial year saw an increase of 7.5%, totalling 4,567 in NSW in the number of rescues to which Marine Rescue NSW responded.

We brought 10,000 boaters to shore, logged on 75,297 vessels (an annual increase on 15%), with 284,528 persons on board.

Of the 4,567 calls for assistance, 1,378 were in response to life saving situations. In total, our radio operators managed 467,857 radio and phone communications.



#### **DEPUTY UNIT COMMANDER**

#### Why You Should Logon to Marine Rescue

Marine Rescue NSW offers the leisure boating public a service to logon with any of its 45 Units to record a trip either to a destination and then return (a LOCAL) or to another destination (a TRANSIT). If it is the latter, the information provided about the vessel and the trip will be passed on to the Unit in whose area the vessel will end its voyage. It will also allow in a Transit voyage for regular SKEDs to be made with other Units along the way.

Whether Local or Transit, the whole idea is that someone is aware of your being out on the water especially if you're on your own.

During a logon conversation on the radio or telephone, from the initial contact only, information about yourself and your vessel will be asked for. This includes registration number, type, size, hull colour, skippers name and an onshore contact name and phone number. Other information may be provided such as car registration, make and colour and trailer registration, if appropriate.

From then on, all the information that is needed for each trip will be where you launched from, where you are going, number of people on board and an onboard mobile phone number. For a Local logon, when you expect to return and if a Transit, when you expect to arrive. Other information for a Transit may be when you expect to make the first Sked and with which Base.

The MRNSW App allows all this detail to be recorded in the app and the logon to be made by your phone without calling the Base by radio or phone. The nearest Base will be alerted to the logon and will inspect the details of the voyage and accept the logon into the statewide Seahawk recording system.

So here's an example.

On 1<sup>st</sup> August, a lone fisherman logged on using the app for a Local trip from the Little Beach ramp to Fingal and also around the Islands, with a logoff time of 1700 (5.00 pm). The Seahawk system showed that he went overdue at that time and following the laid down procedures, the crew in the Communication Centre attempted to contact him numerous times on the onboard mobile number supplied, by sending SMS and on VHF radio. The mobile number never went to voicemail so no message could be left. This attempted contact information is added into the Seahawk vessel record each time to provide an audit trail.

Again, following procedure, the Zone Duty Operations Manager was alerted at 1730 and a Seahawk Incident Management System report created. The details in the logon record showed his make of car and the car registration number. The Radio Operator went down the hill to the ramp parking area and indeed the car and trailer were still there.


We continued to try to contact the vessel but at 60 minutes overdue, we needed to call Marine Area Command (MAC) NSW Water Police. MAC also has access to the MRNSW Seahawk system so were alerted to the communication attempts that had been made. That the car was still in the carpark was passed on to MAC and together with another piece of information they had received, it was found out that the skipper was on dry land. But his boat was not, as it was rolling around in the surf line at Bennetts Beach, just south of Hawkes Nest on the north shore of Port Stephens.

The MAC requested MRPS to put out a Securite navigation warning to other vessels over the radio every hour on the half-hour overnight as a high tide of 2 meters was due in at 2000 hours and it was possible the vessel would float out past the breakers.

As a lone fisherman, the skipper did the right thing by logging on with MRPS using the app. Seahawk alerted us to the overdue and by following procedure, we were able to allow MAC to ensure the skipper was safe.

Both myself and MRO Geoff left that shift knowing that the system works!

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#### **OPERATIONS OFFICER**

Recently we took delivery of our newest Rescue Vessel – a 10-metre Naiad built by Yamba Welding & Engineering. This boat has been built to AMSA, MRNSW and our own very demanding specifications, to ensure that we can continue to provide the level of "Search and Rescue" capabilities that the boaters of Port Stephens have come to expect from Marine Rescue Port Stephens.

The 10-metre Naiad is an extremely strong and stable vessel and is fitted with all the latest technology to aid us in assisting you, the boating public, whenever you find yourself in "distress". This may be just a simple matter of a broken-down engine, flat battery or water in your fuel.... Or, it might be that you are disabled and drifting towards a rocky shoreline in strong winds and in danger of serious mishap.

Whatever... we are here to help you. All you need to do is contact Marine Rescue Port Stephens by radio (VHF 16 or 27MHz) or by phone (4981 3583) and our highly-trained team will get under way to assist you.

Our new boat's Call Sign is "PS-30", and her name is "Shirley Clark" – in honour of one of our longest-serving members who, at the age of 92, is still actively volunteering in the MRPS Gift Shop. Shirley and her late husband Kevin were founding members of the (then) Royal Volunteer Coastal Patrol, with Kevin serving as our first Divisional Commander and both undertaking many hours on the marine radios in our Communications Centre.

PS-30 was delivered to us in late June and we quickly started to get her "Operational Ready" by completing the fit out with all the necessary safety equipment and training the Crew to ensure safe operation. Within just over a week, we received a satisfactory "Operational Readiness Inspection" (ORI) from our Zone Duty Operations Manager and PS-30 was put into immediate service.


PS30 is designed for operations in open waters up to 30 Nautical Miles offshore (that's almost 60 Kilometres), covering the area between Seal Rocks and half-way to Newcastle. That's an area of over 4,500 square kilometres offshore, PLUS the inshore waters of Port Stephens. Our inshore territory includes from the Heads to west of Soldiers Point and everything in between, and up the Myall River to the Broadwater and the Myall Lake inshore from Seal Rocks.

PS30 is fitted with Doppler RADAR, Forward Looking Infra-Red camera (FLIR), Radio Direction Finding (RDF), multiple Radio Frequencies (VHF, 27MHz, Surf Life Saving), Mobile and Satellite phones, the latest Navigational devices, state-of-the-art Vessel Management electronics, and comprehensive First Aid

and Resuscitation equipment (including Oxygen and an Emergency Defibrillator Device).

We, as Crew and operators of PS30, are extremely proud of our new vessel, and the improved capabilities that it provides. We look forward to continuing our professional service to the Port Stephens community.





PS30 'Shirley Clark' has already been tasked to numerous vessel assists, ranging from an 11m yacht south of Fingal Bay with steering problems (towed to Nelson Bay), and a long night-time job involving a 5.75m Open Runabout north of Broughton Island with two flat batteries (towed back to Hawks Nest).

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

#### SAREX / SARDEX - Lake Macquarie

A number of our Boat Crew and Watch Officers recently participated in a SAREX (Search And Rescue Exercise) conducted jointly by MRNSW, Marine Area Command (the Water Police) and SLSC (Surf Life Saving) in, and offshore from, Lake Macquarie.


The objectives of the exercise were to:

- Test the relative capabilities of the three agencies;
- Test communications between all assets (vessels and shore-based);
- Provide a real-time training opportunity for On-Water Assets and SAR Coordinators;
- Develop inter-agency relationships; and
- Display our capabilities to the public via the Media (Radio, TV, Social Media etc).


The SAREX was 'scenario-based', designed to be as realistic as possible, involving MRNSW, the Water Police, and Surf Life Saving assets, as well as the shore-based Radio Operators and Watch Officers in the SRCC (Search and Rescue Coordination Centre).

The scenario was an overturned Newcastle Pilot Vessel, with two people saved, but two people missing in the waters off the Swansea/Red Hill area. The SRCC operators determined the LKP (Last Known Position) of the PIWs (Persons In the Water), the likely drift patterns given local wind and water currents information, and hence the EP (Estimated Position) where they most likely could be found.

A search pattern was then developed to cover the area around the EP (see picture), and a total of 5 Rescue vessels (Water Police plus MRNSW) commenced searching off-shore, while 4 vessels (MRNSW and SLSC) searched in-shore, closer to the beaches and headlands of this rugged coastline. SLSC also made use of a number of UAVs (Unmanned Aerial Vehicles – ie, Drones).



The search area was comprehensively covered, with all eyes on the lookout for 2 life-sized "dummies" floating in the water. The designated Search Area, and the tracks of all vessels (and drones) are shown in the below picture, which I'm sure you'll agree is very comprehensive.



I am pleased to announce that both "dummies" were found by PS30 'Shirley Clark', and the exercise was declared a resounding success by the organisers from both MRNSW and the Marine Area Command (Water Police), with all objectives having been met.

#### **Vessel Operations**


The last couple of months during winter has seen the normal slowing down of boating activities in our waters. Nevertheless, whenever boaters of Port Stephens get into trouble, we have to be ready to respond. Such was the case recently, when we were called upon to assist a couple in their 5.25m Runabout who had trouble with the motor. Not your ordinary type of trouble.... The 90hp Johnson had broken its mountings and fallen into the water! It was only attached by the fuel line, throttle cables and steering link. They had been in outside waters doing a bit of fishing and whale watching, but fortunately the problem occurred when they were in very calm waters just a couple of kilometres short of the Lemon Tree Passage boat ramp.

We were able to secure the motor using ropes, and then towed them alongside us very slowly (about 3 knots) the rest of the way to the LTP ramp.

It was an interesting assist, a type we don't see very often, but it emphasises the need to regularly inspect and service your boats so that you don't run into unforeseen trouble. Who knows... this could have happened when they were just metres away from our rocky shoreline, with wind and current pushing them towards possible disaster.

Take care on the water....

## **Australian Family Owned & Operated**

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#### **NELSON HEAD MUSEUM**



The Lighthouse Keeper's Logbook leads to all sorts of interesting and unexpected stories just by choosing a random vessel name and delving into its history. Recently I noticed the 'destroyer Drayton' being logged into Port Stephens in 1943. It piqued my curiosity. I had assumed it would be an Australian Naval vessel but it belonged to the U.S. Navy.

The USS Drayton was quite a new vessel having been launched in March 1936 with a displacement of 1,500 tons. She joined the Scouting Force of the Pacific Fleet and carried 158 officers and crew along with a range of armament. She was classified as a Mahan class destroyer. The Drayton also had a nickname, the "Blue Beetle" – more about that later.

Interestingly one of her first duties was the search for Amelia Earhart who had disappeared while flying over the Pacific. Whilst her home port was Pearl Harbour, the Drayton was at sea when Pearl Harbour was bombed. The Drayton then spent much of WW2 as an escort to transport convoys moving around the Pacific Ocean. In 1943, the year she was recorded in Port Stephens, the Drayton spent much of the summer escorting Australian troop transports from Townsville to Milne Bay, PNG. She also spent time in Brisbane for a brief overhaul.



So why the "Blue Beetle"? It was all to do with camouflage. Once the USA became actively involved in WW2, their Navy began to develop new standards of camouflaging and disorienting paint. Each camouflage scheme had its own identification classification and some were quite complex. The number of camouflage schemes expanded with the growing spread of naval operations into new areas.

In October 1941 when the Drayton was photographed, she was decked out in a bright sapphire blue camouflage intended to mimic the colour of the Pacific Ocean and thus make her invisible to the enemy. This was an experimental measure as a precursor to Measure 11 (described as Sea Blue) and to be used in the Pacific and the Mediterranean. During the Battle

of the Coral Sea and the Battle of Midway, ships wearing Measure 11 came under attack less often than those wearing Measure 12. (Detailed descriptions of the different camouflage measures can be found on the internet). World War II ship camouflage measures of the United States Navy - Wikipedia

Whilst the Measure 11 camouflage earnt the Drayton the nickname Blue Beetle, she was photographed in 1944 in Measure 31 as shown in the second photo which would suggest she didn't remain blue for very long.

The USS Drayton (DD-366) had a short life despite surviving WW2. She was sold for scrap in December 1946 and broken up but no doubt remembered by many of her crew as the Blue Beetle.

The grounds for the wedding have been manicured to perfection by our Maintenance Team, while the Wedding Team worked hard to have the stage with




the arbour and chairs and all the trimmings ready for the guests to arrive.
