MARINE RESCUE NSW – PORT STEPHENS UNIT SERVICES PROVIDED





Category One Marine Search and Rescue Co-ordination Centre (SARCC). Located at the former Inner Light and now Heritage Site at Nelson Head, 32°42.632 S; 152°09.667 E (overlooking Shoal Bay and looking out through the entrance to Port Stephens). Accredited by the State Rescue Board.

Communications Centre, Nelson Head - VMR217. Operated by trained and qualified volunteers, 24 hours a day; 7 days a week; 365 days a year. Monitoring 27MHz, and VHF marine frequencies, emergency and calling channels.

Apart from radio coverage generally to the local boating community, the Communications Centre offers:

- Emergency support to vessels in trouble
- A Marine Radio Safety (MRS) service Boat Register
- A checkpoint and radio coverage for recreational vessels transiting up and down the coastline adjacent to Port Stephens.
- Weather readings and local conditions observations and
- Current Bureau of Meteorology weather forecasts and tidal information. (These can be obtained by contacting the Comms Centre by phone or radio and are also offered in regular radio skeds).

Accredited Rescue Vessels : Available on a 24 hr. call-out basis, subject to Police tasking. (See 'Rescue Vessels' page).

Weather recording facility: Accredited by the Bureau of Meteorology. Regular reports on local conditions are electronically communicated to the Bureau, as well as to Radio, TV and Print media outlets in the local area.

Gift Shop: Marine Rescue Port Stephens operates a unique gift shop on the ground floor of the Marine Rescue Communications Centre at Nelson Head Reserve, Nelson Bay. The shop offers gifts with a nautical flavour and a range to suit every budget. Without income from the Gift Shop, the Unit would find it very difficult, if not near impossible, to operate. Open to the public, 7 days a week from 9am to 3pm.

Nelson Head Reserve: Marine Rescue Port Stephens Unit of which Marine Rescue NSW is the responsible entity to the State Government for upkeep of this Crown Land heritage precinct "Reserve".

A small museum is operated by volunteers and is open to the public, 7 days a week from 9am to 3pm.

A portion of the Historic Lighthouse Keepers Cottage is leased to a private operator "Inner Light Tea Rooms" for breakfast, lunch, morning and afternoon teas/coffee, from 8.30am to 3.00pm.

Wedding Ceremonies: Bookings can be made to hold weddings on the reserve (see Lighthouse Weddings page).

Honouring Long and Dedicated Service

The Unit made the semi-finals (no mean feat when seeing the competition), but to his great credit, Harold reached the short-list of five finalists.

The citation on his nomination read, in part,

'Harold Gibson is a devoted member of the Nelson Head Lighthouse Reserve Management Committee for 34 years. Harold has been a driving force behind the reserve's remarkable evolution. Starting as a modest Port Stephens tourist attraction in 1990, Harold helped transform it into a bustling destination with over 140,000 annual visitors. His knowledge and captivating tours have made the reserve a beloved community asset, enticing visitors from near and far. Harold's contributions to the Reserve include actively recruiting volunteers and engaging schools. His legacy, marked by dedication, preserves the site's historical significance for future generations and exemplifies the true spirit of volunteering.

The wealth of knowledge and his willingness to undertake additional responsibilities within the Unit has been exemplary and appreciated by his peers, visiting public and the community. He has been an essential part of the Unit's development providing guidance and moral support during time of need to all members.

The award was announced at the Marine Rescue AGM, also held on 25 November.

We look forward to the Marine Rescue Commissioner visiting our Unit early in the new year to make the presentation.

Approaching Christmas on the Water


New VHF Radio Coverage for Port Stephens

Above Nelson Bay, on Lily Hill, is the Gan Gan lookout. Multiple towers host telecommunications and radio equipment and now there is one more radio and antenna linked through to the Communications Centre on Nelson Head.




Because VHF radio is 'line of sight', this extra height now gives our radio operators greater coverage into areas that were once black holes, such as Fame Cove and North Arm Cove, plus to the repeater channel 21 to the north of Seal Rocks.

The coverage from the existing radios on Nelson Head, exclude the repeater channel 80 on Mount Sugarloaf behind Newcastle.

We now have a range from beyond Seal Rocks in the north, down to Morisset in the south and out to sea beyond the Shelf. We have advised other Marine Rescue Units at Lemon Tree Passage, Newcastle, Lake Macquarie and further south that if they are having trouble raising a vessel on channel 16, ask Port Stephens to attempt to make contact using the Gan Gan radio.

Presentation to Lower Hunter RFS

It is over a year now since Marine Rescue ceased being the overnight radio Firecom for Lower Hunter and Hunter Valley RFS districts. All RFS districts have now moved to a Computer Assisted Dispatch (CAD) system used by many other State emergency services such as Police, Fire & Rescue, etc. As a result radio




operators in the Communications Brigades have become CAD operators.

To mark the 13 years that MRPS had assisted our fellow emergency service volunteers, a plaque was presented to LH Manager, Superintendent Marty Siemsen and Bert Pipan at their East Maitland District Centre. A similar will be presented to Hunter Valley District at Bulga when next it can be arranged.



As we did in the disastrous fires in 2019-20, we again offered to assist the RFS should such calamity return but it will be in a more supporting logistics role rather than radio operators.

OPERATIONS OFFICER

The last few months has seen Marine Rescue Port Stephens involved in several very serious search operations as well as an interesting incident with several twists and turns.



The first serious operation saw the rescue vessel Port Stephens 30 tasked to assist the Nelson Bay Water Police to search for the pilot of a missing helicopter that crashed just north of Yacaaba headland off Bennetts Beach. This search eventually found the wreckage of the helicopter but unfortunately did not find the missing pilot.



The second serious operation involved both our rescue vessels, Port Stephens 30 and Port Stephens 31. The operation required our vessels to assist Newcastle Water Police in concert with vessels from Marine Rescue Newcastle and Marine Rescue Lemon Tree Passage to search for a missing swimmer off Stockton Beach. This search was conducted over three days with no success.

The most interesting incident we were involved in started as a very routine call. The wife of a fisherman called the base to request assistance for her husband. He was by himself in a small tinny fishing off Soldiers Point boat ramp and was unable to get his engine started. She advised his phone had run out of power while calling her so had no means to communicate with the base.

Our radio base advised the duty callout officer of the task who proceeded to activate a crew to respond in our smaller vessel Port Stephens 30 (PS30). As the crew were proceeding to the dock the radio base put out an all ships call requesting any vessel in the area who may be

able to assist. At the time a vessel called Song Lines advised they were in the area and was able to assist if required. Song Lines was advised to stand by as PS 30 was only 15 mins or so away.

PS 30 arrived at the Soldiers Point boat ramp and commenced a search of the area. As they were unable to find the tinny they made contact with Song Lines to determine if they had seen the vessel. Because Song Lines was asked to standby they did not look for the vessel and therefore had not seen it in the area.

PS 30 proceeded to expand the search and observed a tinny on the opposite side of Dowardee Island putting it to the west of the island outside the Soldiers Point boat ramp area. PS30 proceeded around the island towards the vessel's location. As PS30 was proceeding around the island they noted a surf ski drifting in the water near the island without a passenger. When they approached the tinny the crew observed two people in the tinny, one with a double ended paddle like those used on a surf ski and another occupant using a single paddle attempting to row the tinny. The crew was able to confirm this was indeed the vessel they were looking for but was confused as to how there were two occupants when the initial call was only for one. As the crew were taking up the tow the second passenger identified he was the owner of the surf ski and requested the crew assist by recovering his ski.

Once the tinny was under tow the crew proceeded to recover the surf ski and commenced the tow towards Soldier Point boat ramp.

At this time the owner of the tinny advised the crew that he was looking to be towed to Greenplay Point near the entrance to Cromarty's Bay as he launched his tinny from the banks of the point near his home. The crew confirmed they were able to assist and proceeded in the direction of Greenplay Point. As they were proceeding towards the point one of the crew called to stop the boat as they were about to run over a line that was floating across their path. They were able to stop the boat in time to prevent the line from wrapping around their propellors. Upon investigation they found the line was secured to a moored yacht approximately 150 meters away and was drifting across the water with a float secured to the other end. The crew commenced to remove the line from the water to prevent any other vessels being caught out by the line.

During the line removal the surf ski rider advised he could continue from this location and proceeded to take his surf ski and paddle towards shore. During this same period another tinny with two passengers passed PS30 and advised the crew they were on the way to their boat as they had been advised someone was on their vessel. (Unbeknownst to the crew the two occupants of the tinny were very new members of Marine Rescue Port Stephens!)

Once the floating line was secured, the crew proceeded to drop the rescued tinny safely off at Greenplay Point. As the crew were tidying PS30 for their return to berth they noted the second tinny returning now with three occupants on the vessel. As they approached they advised PS30 that they had found the third person stranded on their vessel. He had attempted to swim from his vessel to shore and after approximately 25mins was only able to climb onto a nearby yacht.

He advised he was very thirsty and requested some water. PS30 provided the water and then after confirming he was feeling ok proceeded back to the dock.

A number of days later the new Marine Rescue Port Stephens members on the second tinny spoke to the crew members of PS30 to advise that the person they had found on their vessel was found attempting to hide from them. He had moved the security cameras so that he could not be observed. Upon being found he proceeded to provide them with the story that he had been trying to swim ashore and had struggled with the current, so he climbed onto their vessel. After PS30 left the area he requested to be dropped back on his vessel where his girlfriend was located.

A day after the incident the new members were made aware that the person they found on their vessel was wanted by the police.

Several days after this incident the radio room received a call from a woman who was stranded on a moored vessel as her partner had been arrested that morning and she could not get ashore. The radio room reported this to Marine Area Command (NSW Police) who advised them that the police would assist with the matter.

What started as a routine matter just seemed to grow and grow. You would struggle to write this story!

Lessons learned: things aren't always as they seem and keep a lookout for suspicious behaviour on the water and don't hesitate to call the Police.

New Port Stephens vessel named in honour of long-serving volunteer during commissioning ceremony

Member for Port Stephens Kate Washington has welcomed a new \$667,000 Marine Rescue NSW vessel, which provides a significant boost for the Port Stephens community.



Ms Washington was joined by Marine Rescue NSW Deputy Commissioner Darren Schott to officially commission *Port Stephens 30* to the Marine Rescue NSW fleet.

The new vessel, funded by the NSW Government and community donations, was today also named the *Shirley Clark* in honour of the 92-year-old Port Stephens unit member.

Ms Washington said it was an honour to commission the *Shirley Clark* and recognise the decades of dedication by one of Marine Rescue NSW's longest serving volunteers.

"Shirley has a long history of helping keep boaters safe in the region alongside her late husband Kevin. "She has given so much to the community and it is wonderful that this new vessel will bear her name while it carries out its vital life-saving work on the region's waterways."



"On behalf of the people of Port Stephens, and all of our boating visitors, I thank Shirley and all of the dedicated, hardworking Port Stephens Marine Rescue volunteers," Ms Washington said.



"This rescue boat has the speed and technology to quickly and safely get rescue crews where they are needed when vital seconds count. This rescue vessel is a valuable investment in the safety of Port Stephens and the Hunter Coast's active local boating community and its many visiting boaters," she said.

Ms Washington also encouraged all boaters to Log On and Log Off with Marine Rescue NSW either using the free Marine Rescue app or via VHF channel 16.

"Using the Marine Rescue app or establishing contact through VHF Channel 16 ensures that a search will be initiated for boaters who don't return from a voyage as planned"

Marine Rescue NSW Deputy Commissioner Darren Schott said the new rescue boat was designed and built to meet demanding local operating conditions and would prove a reassuring presence for locals and visitors alike. "Boaters at Port Stephens can take comfort knowing this state-of-the-art vessel is at the ready should they run into trouble," he said.

"With twin 300 horsepower Suzuki outboard engines and a specialist Raymarine suite of maritime navigation equipment, the 10 metre Naiad rescue boat is equipped to perform a variety of operational tasks."

"The upgraded search and rescue technology on board including radar, sonar and FLIR night vision has improved our search capability, which is vital to our mission of saving lives on the water."





"As well as operating on the Karauh River and Port Stephens Bay, this boat can quickly deploy up to 30 nautical miles out to sea to rescue boaters who find themselves in trouble offshore."

"In the first nine months of this year the Port Stephens unit has been incredibly busy assisting boaters, completing 228 rescue missions, 101 of which were emergencies," Deputy Commissioner Schott said.



Marine Rescue Port Stephens Unit Commander Ben van der Wijngaart thanked the local community for its generous support of the unit's fundraising efforts to contribute 20 per cent of the cost of the new vessel. He said the new vessel was a significant improvement over the unit's former 8.5 metre rescue boat.

"With improved handling and manoeuvrability and greater volunteer comfort, our crews are able to operate more safely for longer periods and in a wider range of weather and sea conditions."



"The vessel's name, the *Shirley Clark*, is a fitting tribute to much respected life-member Shirley Clark. Shirley has been a volunteer with the Port Stephens unit for more than 40 years and remains a popular and highly respected member of the Port Stephens community," he said.

RESCUES CONT'D

Saturday 28th October 2023 training turned into a medical evacuation of an injured person from their sail catamaran who suffered a severe injury to their leg.


As it was suspected he may also have broken a bone, the skipper of the vessel was unable to get help himself.

The injury was reported to Marine Rescue Port Stephens radio base and as the rescue vessels were already on the water, PS31 and crew were quickly on the scene to assist the injured skipper and his two dogs.

The skipper was helped onboard the rescue vessel where his injuries were treated by the crew.

An ambulance was organised to pick up the patient at the public wharf at d'Albora Marina.

The injured skipper was placed into the hands of the ambulance medics and the dogs were returned to a relative for safekeeping - all well from their adventure.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS OFFICER

Imagine going for a swim with your friends at beautiful Stockton Beach. It's a calm sunny spring day the waves are small so you jump right in there and before you know it you're in a deep drop-off and you're being washed out to open water!



That's what happened to a missing person on a Sunday in November and for the following three days crews from Marine Rescue Port Stephens on both our rescue vessels John Thompson PS31 and Shirley Clark PS30 have been out conducting searches with other emergency services.

Imagine you were helping conduct these search and rescue incidents.

Whilst you'd be feeling lots of emotions as a volunteer member on the rescue vessel, you've been called and down at the berth at Nelson's Bay within 20 minutes along with your other crew preparing the rescue vessel to go out for the run down to Stockton in about an hour to coordinated with Water Police Marine Area Command and other services. Then a methodical search patterns all day in rough and windy conditions until doing the long run home late in the afternoon to pack up, only to perhaps be asked to do it all again tomorrow.

All of this unpaid.



We needed at least four people including the skipper and three crew on each boat, and there's only about a dozen available crew at any one time, so it meant many of the Marine Rescue volunteers putting in multiple days work in these extremely trying circumstances and yet the sense of contribution to the community makes it not just worthwhile but also richly rewarding.

We hope not to be called on for a serious incident anytime soon but another rescue is always just around the corner.

Our crew come from all walks of life, some with little or no background in boating.

Anyone with the interest and willingness to learn can step up as we train all our new recruits with Marine Rescue NSW Registered Approved Training Courses.

We just need people who will turn up to do a job and chip in. We'd love to grow our boat crew and indeed all our volunteer teams and we have great roles for people in the communications centre, gift shop, Nelson Head Reserve grounds, rescue vessel maintenance, cottage museum, weddings and our fundraising team.


If you have family or friends visiting over the upcoming school holidays, consider bringing them up to visit the Museum and check out what's new and different.
